Introduction

“Let’s Protect Sri Lankan Biodiversity” The Rufford second in-country conference - Sri Lanka was held from 27th to 29th January 2022 at Oak Ray Regency, Deveni Rajasinghe Mawatha, Kandy, Sri Lanka. The Bio Conservation Society (BCSL)- Sri Lanka has organized this second Rufford in-country conference in Sri Lanka to share the project experience of Rufford grantees among them and also make known to general public. Full day presentations were conducted in 27th and 28th and a field trip was conducted in the third day 29th. However, due to limited number of recent Rufford grantees in Sri Lanka non- grantees were invited from various institutions such as Department of Wildlife Conservation, Several Universities, National Institute of Fundamental Studies and Ministry of Environment etc. Furthermore, several postgraduate and undergraduate students conducted presentations on their research findings (non-grantees). The conference was conducted in hybrid mode (physical and online modes). Four Rufford grantees from Pakistan, India, Nepal and Bangladesh presented their project activities via zoom platform. Moreover, some advance level school children were invited to the conference as attendees to get an experience. Whole two day sessions were live streamed through zoom and Facebook. Altogether about 140 individuals were joined the conference during the three days while some people attended whole conference while some only one or two days.

Inauguration

Opening of conference was marked by the lighting of traditional oil lamp by some attendees representing different organizations. After that welcome speech was delivered by Dr. Lalith Ekanayake (BCSL), Chief organizer of the conference. Thereafter, keynote speech was delivered by Prof. Ashoka Dangolla a prominent scientist attached to the Faculty of Veterinary Medicine and Animal Science, University of Peradeniya, Sri Lanka. His speech on “Current Human Wildlife Conflicts and Evidence on Biodiversity Imbalances in Sri Lanka” and discussed the conflict of human with various wild animals in Sri Lanka such as elephants, monkeys, crocodiles, sea turtles, leopards, peacocks, poisonous snakes, wasps etc. After the keynote speech Dr. Lalith Ekanayake presented on “Community participation for the sea turtles & coastal biodiversity conservation in Kalpitiya peninsula, Sri Lanka” mainly focusing Rufford funded community based conservation programmes.



Day Three Saturday 29th January 2022 - Field trip to Deanston in Knuckles

On the final day, the participants were taken on a field trip to Deanston and seven falls in the world heritage conserved reserve Knuckles. It was traveled about 70km from the conference venue and the trip started about 6.30 am from the hotel.

The Knuckles Mountain Range lies in central Sri Lanka, in the Districts of Matale and Kandy. The range takes its name from a series of recumbent folds and peaks in the west of the massif which resemble the knuckles of clenched fist when viewed from certain locations in the Kandy District. Whilst this name was assigned by early British surveyors, the Sinhalese residents have traditionally referred to the area as Dumbara Kanduvetiya meaning Mist-laden Mountain Range.

The higher montane area is often robed in thick layers of cloud. In addition to its aesthetic value, the range is of great scientific interest. It is a climatic microcosm of the rest of Sri Lanka as the conditions of all the climatic zones in the country are exhibited in the massif. At higher elevations there is a series of isolated cloud forests, harbouring a variety of flora and fauna. Although the range constitutes approximately 0.03% of the island's total area, it is home to a significantly higher proportion of the country's biodiversity. The isolated Knuckles range harbours several relict, endemic flora and fauna that are distinct from central massif. More than 34 percent of Sri Lanka's endemic trees, shrubs, and herbs are only found in these forests. Knuckles Conservation Forest was included in UNESCO natural world heritage list in 2010 as part of Central Highlands of Sri Lanka.

Mr. Kapila Weerathunga Range Forest officer at Forest Department and other officers from the Deanston forest office guided the field trip. First the participants were taken to the Deanston “Mini World's End”. It was about 53km from the hotel and then the round hike is about 3 km distance by walking. After the Mini Worlds End participants were taken to seven falls which is another 17 km from the Deanston. Seven falls mean seven small water falls in the upper part of the “Heen Ganga” river. Mr. Kapila explained about the Knuckles forest range and its important biodiversity. The participants had a chance gain more knowledge about the area. It was notice that all the participants were well enjoyed the trip while some were afraid of leeches.





India's support has made a difference to Sri Lanka's situation, said Sri Lankan Minister G.L. Piriya, on his first visit to India since he was appointed last year, making it clear that the 80 agreements announced in recent weeks have allowed the night to move on from the problems of "immediate past".

In an interview with The Island, Prof. Piriya cautioned, however the unresolved conflict over the rights WAS a constant irritant in bilateral relations, and the two sides have agreed to a series of agreements, including one billion swap arrangement of 800 million dollars of credit, a current swap arrangement of 800 million dollars from India.

In addition, India and Sri Lanka concluded a joint pending agreement to jointly develop the oil tank in Trincomalee, and have also number of infrastructure projects involving the private sector, which will be further discussed when Finance Minister Basil Rajapaksa visits India in the next few weeks.

Lanka has also invited Prime Minister Narendra Modi to attend the BIMSTEC summit in Colombo on March 26, and hold "substantive" bilateral talks.

All of this has engendered a degree of confidence which we didn't see in the immediate past. And it has
