2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

We did not foresee the safety problem. During the habitat sampling in the established croftonweed which were higher than 2 m, the team members were always feeling uncomfortable and vomiting, just because of the poisonous chemical coming from the croftonweed. Furthermore, it was not easy to persuade the certain fundamental government from restoring the degraded habitat with croftonweed.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- In LYPAP, 612,386 ha has been invaded by croftonweed, which accounts for 10.11% of the area of LYPAP.
- All the ecological message included in variables could be decided by three most principal factors, i.e. general ecological characteristics, humidity and light, and botanic biodiversity. In principal, the occurring frequency of croftonweed will be related to 11 ecological factors such as elevation and landscape type.
- It is useless to use single methods to control croftonweed invasion, but the integrated controlling method, including chemical control, mechanical control, manual control and biological control should be adopted and publicised.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

Our project employed the local Yi peoples to work as the guides and helpers in the team, which gave the economic benefit and knowledge about alien species. Also, through lectures and public presentations to the local communities, the environmental consciousness of the local Yi peoples has been improved. Moreover, the researchers in local colleges and the fundamental staff in the



managing bureau have been organised and directly participated in the project, which helped them to improve their research skills and related knowledge.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Actually, we are trying to find funding to continue this croftonweed works.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

Firstly, we have been managing collected data and trying to publish our results in international journals, and we will continue to publicise the results through participation in related conferences.

7. Timescale: Over what period was the RSG used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

- From September 2008 to October 2008, the team consisted of more than 20 members including the students and teachers from the local college and Central University for Nationalities, worked in LYPAP.
- From June 2009 to August 2009, the team consisted of more than 20 members including the students and teachers from the local college and Central University for Nationalities, worked in LYPAP.
- From September 2008 to October 2009, members from the local managing authorities, such as fundamental government and Grass Bureau, have been surveying the invasion pattern and the intensity.
