2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- We monitored the entire research area collecting considerable amounts of biological information on mammals (tracks), amphibian, reptiles and birds (census, trapping and releasing) and plants (herbarium samples). We obtained data on traditional biological knowledge within Cuicatec culture through the use of participant observation, qualitative (open and semi-structured) interviews, structured interviews (including questionnaires, free listing, pile sorting exercises) and communitarian workshops and focus groups. We have been developing an ecotourism guide as a tool for the ecotourism programme, based on biological and ethnobiological data. We have received financial support to allow us to publish this guide by July 2009.
- We have actively involved local people, training them and involving them as the main protagonists in the ecotourism programme. By means of consensus agreement, local people



selected three teams to develop the following activities. 1) **Ecotourism committee** (11 members) include men and women in charge to develop embroiders, rattans and handicrafts women groups. Other activities such as the recovery of their traditional dress and training as ecotourism guides have also been included. 2) The **environmental education committee** undertook responsibility to collect and instruct how to manage all inorganic waste such as plastic bags, cans, pet (plastic) and batteries. Also, as a team (medical staff, this committee (5 members) and us), we will develop a strategy of environmental education within village. 3) The **Cuicatec language committee.** During the 1950's Cuicatec people were actively discouraged to speak their language, and the language has consequently suffered a serious decline. The remaining Cuicatec speakers are very worried about its possible extinction. The Cuicatec language committee is taking a proactive role to recover, promote and teach Cuicatec language, enabling elderly people as teachers. Cuicatec lessons are been planned especially for children and all people interested in the village.

• Finally, and based on data collected from the ecotourism course and communitarian workshops, we have gathered all necessary data to construct an ecotourism strategy. Potential places to set the ecotourism (four places), complementary activities (embroiders, rattans and handcrafts women groups) and priority activities (environmental education programme and recycling programme) have been identified. These priority and complementary activities must be carried out before the ecotourism programme will be executed. We hope the strategy will be finished by July 2009.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

The local community is completely involved in the project; we have been working with the community all the time. We are now developing the ecotourism strategy together. We can mention four main benefits than local people have got from this project:

- 1) We noticed that local people have started working as a team. They always have reached goals through their leaders, but now, in addition, most people in village (including women, children) have taken an active role in the project, working together with initiative.
- 2) The village can get a document which includes all biological data obtained in local (Cuicatec) and scientific terms (scientific names, diversity indexes, etc.), and this will mean a powerful tool to ensure this region as one of the most biological rich places to conserve in the world.
- 3) All the economical benefits implied by this project consider everyone in the village, not just one particular sector.
- 4) The most valuable benefit for local people is that children and youth are reconsidering the value of their indigenous lineage and language. While most people are no longer Cuicatec speakers they are interested in attend Cuicatec language and getting involved in traditional aspects.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Most certainly, yes. We have been working in conclude the ecotourism strategy and the ecotourism guide by July 2009. After that, we will be ready to work with all the complementary activities described in point 3 before to undertake the ecotourism programme.



6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

First, two undergraduate dissertations and one PhD dissertation will be produced as a result of the project. In addition, we have written a final report of our project in Spanish, which is widely available and which we have sent to different governmental and non-governmental offices. We hope soon have our website to put this report in it. Finally, we are preparing some papers to be published in specialised journals with all our biological and ethnobiological studies, and the most important, it will be the ecotourism guide and final document with the Ecotourism strategy to the community.

7. Timescale: Over what period was the RSG used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The RSG was used for six months, between April and September, 2008. This timescale is as the original planned, no changes were in it.
