2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

There were no unforeseen difficulties during our works.



3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- Identified and setting up the first three raptor-watch sites in Vietnam including Tam Dao, Sapa and Cuc Phuong. Before the project, there were no raptor watch sites in Vietnam.
- Three key staffs of national parks have been selected and trained to be the future counters
 for long term monitoring of raptors migration in North Vietnam. These people have been
 carefully selected and trained and they are all commit and interesting to continuous this
 work after the project.
- Awareness of local people and communities have been raised, particularly the local authorities and staffs. Before the project, nobody at three national parks knows about the importance of raptor migration at their parks and the local people never aware about this group. After the project, many people want to join in our project as a volunteer counters.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

The local communities have involved throughout the project period. At the beginning we invited them joining at the seminars and presentations to introduce about raptors within their sites. We have collected the related information from them (about threats, status, roosting sites of raptors...), we hire them as the local guide to find the best places for raptor watching. During the raptor watch days, the local communities also joined and contributed their ideas on raptor migration routes. Particularly, at Sapa town, many local minority people can sell their products during our raptor watching time for visitors. They have also helped us to distribute our leaflet about raptor migration in Vietnam.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

- Further training will be give to the keys and potential raptor counters (raptors identification, migration routes, etc).
- Setting up long term monitoring programme of raptor migration at both sites.
- Finding the financial funding to support the work.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

The seminars will be implemented to show the results at three national parks. The final technical report will be sent to the donor to be published in the website, related International and local organizations, local authorities such as Asian Raptor Research and Conservation Network (ARRCN), Birdlife International in Indochina, WWF, FFI, WSC, IUCN, Forest Protection Department, Institute of Ecology and Biological Resources, Hanoi National University, Vietnam Birdwatching Club. Some special papers will be compose to send to the national Biology Journal, Bulletins.

 on raptors migration have been built among the local staffs of national parks, however, to be
 the good and keen raptor counters, it is necessary to improve the capacity and knowledge
 continuously.
- Building up the long term monitoring programme. This is very important to keep the work
 going after the project. The monitoring programme will be the first model to be applied for
 every future raptor migration monitoring in Vietnam.
