We delivered for free a total of 86 exemplars of the field-guide 'Arachnids of Uruguay, covering the 19 provinces of Uruguay and handing the book to park- rangers, teachers, professors, and educational training institutes.



2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

We did not suffer any difficulties along the project.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

One of the most important outcomes was to print of the field guide 'Arachnids of Uruguay' that was presented to the public on a special event in our research institute (Instituto de Investigaciones Biológicas Clemente Estable, Montevideo, Uruguay) and at the Fourth Latin American Arachnology Congress, held at Armenia, Colombia. The field guide has 256 pages, with information about more than 100 arachnid species that can be found in Uruguay. It also includes 29 articles by specialists about topics such as behaviour, ecology, dangerous species, arachnids and culture, traffic and conservation. A second important outcome was to share our knowledge about topics related to arachnids with students, teachers and professors, and be successful in attracting their attention to these animals and their importance as part of the ecosystems. We delivered the field guide to the institutions and organised workshops about arachnids of Uruguay, their function as insecticides for free, their general harmless condition and conservation problematic. We gave 24 talks along the 19 provinces during the one year period of the project and delivered 86 field guides. We handed out field-guides and dictated informative talks to Uruguayan park rangers that work at protected areas. Our third outcome would be to gain attention from the press and through this, to reach the community at a broader scale. During 2011-2012, we gave 12 interviews to radio programmes, two to TV channels and three interviews to local newspapers, where we expressed our main concern about arachnids in our country and their value.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

In every occasion we contacted educational institutions and/or protected areas, they showed enthusiasm towards our visit and took charge of the organisation of the logistics. After each talk, we delivered exemplars of the field-guide for the institution and provided an email for contact to respond for further questions, or report cases of traffic. The assistants to the talks showed deep curiosity on these animals, and made many questions after the talk. They learnt about what animals can be dangerous to humans and what they need to do in case of an accident with an arachnid. Assistants also showed concern about spider traffic and the lack of laws protecting them in our country. In two cases, high school students decided to start projects using arachnids as models. Most of the assistants reduced or lost their negative feelings towards arachnids after the workshops and were surprised to find so many positive aspects surrounding these animals, for example their importance for controlling insect populations.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

We plan to continue our work of divulgation on arachnids of Uruguay. We are willing to organise workshops of 3 days work, with theory and fieldwork, on selected points of our country where there is negative impact on vulnerable arachnids. We also plan to make new samplings on four localities sampled a decade ago, to determine the current situation of populations of *Grammosotola mollicoma*, the tarantula most affected by traffic as pet. As a continuation of this project, we are working on documentary film project about arachnids of our country. The variety of sizes, colours and behavioural displays of a singular beauty, turn arachnids in subjects to be captured with its whole splendour in an adequate film recording. The name of the project is 'Arachnids of Uruguay:



stories from a world of eight legs', under the Direction of Marcelo Casacuberta, a recognised Uruguayan photographer, director and film-maker. We believe that the film will be a useful tool for divulgation of knowledge about Uruguayan arachnid fauna and will contribute to reinforce conservation efforts to protect this group of animals that is hugely undervalued in our country.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

Through handing in the exemplars of the field guide in educational institutions the 19 provinces of Uruguay, in interviews to the press and during the workshops. Also, we will share the information through articles of divulgation in national and international magazines.

7. Timescale: Over what period was the RSG used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The present project took place 1 year, from June 2011 to June 2012, as was originally planned.

9. Looking ahead, what do you feel are the important next steps?

As was stated before, we plan to continue with our educational programme on 'Arachnids of Uruguay' through more extensive workshops including new localities along the country. We also feel as essential to compile the necessary information to reinforce the need to protect spiders that are being affected by pet-trade. The project of the documentary film about 'Arachnids of Uruguay' has already obtained financial support for the photography and filming. We hope to get financial support to finish with the edition of the material, with the idea that the final product will be projected on TV



and along the country. The beauty of the images will open a new door to the audience to the beauty of these charismatic animals.

10. Did you use the RSGF logo in any materials produced in relation to this project? Did the RSGF receive any publicity during the course of your work?

Yes. The RSGF logo is included in the back cover of the printed field-guide 'Arachnids of Uruguay'. Also, RSGF was acknowledged during our talks and the logo was included in the presentations during our workshops along the country.
