 - We obtained information on new communal harrier roost sites.
 - Some of these could give us considerable amount of information on their wintering ecology.
 - We obtained information on the problems associated with old traditional harrier roosts in this important region of harriers which will be helpful for their management.

Local communities took special interest as now they are well aware of the importance of harriers as biological control and they understand importance of biodiversity. Youth especially college students and naturalists supported our work and took active part in our activities. They updated themselves on harriers by joining our project and some are monitoring harriers on their own in their respective areas

Yes, with new information on harriers with us now we are in a better position to target these sites again for detail and more systematic survey to obtain information on harrier population dynamics.

- We plan to distribute harrier identification manual to more people and students.

The Rufford Foundation grant was the only source for our project and we used it for almost 18 months. For some sites we received survey permission late and we got delayed and also for some sites we were waiting for right season.
