2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

Second National Election for constitutional assembly was held on November 19th, 2013. This election compelled us to change schedule of the programme. Other factors that affect the projects were farming season and thatch grass collection from the reserve.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- a. Students were made participation in different activities of the project. Knowledge of students and their attitude towards birds were changed dramatically. Total 743 students were benefited directly from this project.
- b. Influential people such as teachers and local leaders were trained well regarding conservation of wetlands birds and many of participants used telescope first time. They knew benefits of conservation and their role in conservation of wetlands and their creatures specially wetland birds. Furthermore, tribal people *Mallaha* who are depend on wetland were aware through group discussion and training.
- c. Publication of posters and distribution, Display of Hoard Boards and Simsar programme broad casted from FM Radio influenced both participants of the program and non-participants.



4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

As this project was directly targeted to local people through students, influential people and Mallaha tribe, the participants in each activity was enthusiastic and overwhelming towards programme activities. Everyone changed their perception towards wetland bird and conservation. Students and teachers upgraded their knowledge level on birds and conservation. Mallah people were mainly benefitted through training on wiring. Other non-participants residing around KTWR were benefitted through FM radio programme, posters and hoarding boards.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Yes, I am planning to continue this work in future on landscape level. Additionally, this work will include migratory bird research and analyse aspect of bird watch tourism.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

Electronic copy of this report will be distributed to various organisations working in conservation in Nepal and around the world. At the same time, link of Rufford website will be uploaded to social media to view this report.

7. Timescale: Over what period was The Rufford Foundation grant used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The Rufford Foundation grant was used entirely to implement this work. The number of days expensed in the field as per proposed. However, total period was expanded because of constitution election in Nepal, other local reasons and my involvement in other conservation activities in Annapurna Region.

9. Looking ahead, what do you feel are the important next steps?

Koshi Tappu Wildlife Reserve and Kosi Bird Observatory should continue to work with schools, teachers and members of buffer zone in reference to wetland bird conservation. They can at least conduct education campaign twice a year. The next steps after this programme, the work should be more focus on educating youth clubs, participatory research on migratory water birds, and identification of bird watching hotspots at landscape level.
