Funds allocated to part of these activities were used for patrols as these improves conservation of most wildlife		
Provide basic field equipments to rangers			XXX	Field equipments were provided to rangers and includes one GPS, one computer and one tent. For data collection, batteries and datasheets were provided to rangers		
Enhance support to community awareness activities			XXX	Through the duration of the project there have been regular meetings with communities regarding Luama landscape. A conflict analysis process was undertaken, cultural ceremony to support conservation of the reserve was held with local chiefs Support from RACOD was valuable as they supported the literacy project and microcredit scheme with rangers wives to improve on their livelihood.		

2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

The major difficulty concerns the mean of transport to count hippos. Given the limited source of funding and the cost of transportation in the area, we had to use boat without engine which has been dangerous to our team. One of our field expeditions was charged and attacked by hippos and the boat was destroyed. Lucky enough there was no casualties.

Another issue is about the socioeconomic vulnerability of the area where communities and park staff have more expectations than what project could deliver. While our project was mainly focused to conservation and education, there are requests from communities to support small scale micro-project to improve their livelihoods.



3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- Support to law enforcement has improved on the conservation status of the reserve and build trust with communities
- This research has allowed getting distribution of wildlife in sectors covered by patrols and illegal activities deterred.
- Support to community being the key of success to conservation in developing countries, this project improves on relationships between park staff, local chiefs and the army deployed in the area

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

This project aimed at improving knowledge for communities regarding protection of resources of Luama landscape. This was done through meetings in different villages with different stakeholders on conservation of Luama Game reserve.

Support from our partner RACOD, there is a literacy project that has been started and has 13 women from 17 to 39 years for writing and reading skills.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

We are motivated with progress made from this project and would like to pursue. We submitted an application to Whitley and didn't get funding but we are aiming at applying again to Rufford to support ranger patrols and community work focussing on improving the literacy centre and livelihood project in the area.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

We'll be organizing conference at local universities regarding conservation of biodiversity of Luama region and hippos particularly as they becoming rare compared to the past.
