• No major problem was encountered in the field except for sudden upsurge in dollar rate.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- It was the first study of butterfly in the area and identifying 181 species has really helped to generate baseline information for the park for future conservation programme.
- This project helped to teach team members, techniques of safe capturing and identifying of butterflies and further encourage school, local and religious communities in conservation of biodiversity.
- Awareness programme on butterfly was first of its kind in the country. Especially religious community were really excited and thankful in getting such valuable knowledge.



4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

- In some area local people were taken as potters and field guide, they were paid daily wages.
- They were really made aware on significance of butterflies in ecosystem (pollination, food web and climate changes).

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

- Yes, with this knowledge and baseline information, we appraised the higher authority for further study in adjoining park in landscape conservation. Now we are also confident to carry out further study.
- Planned and proposed to develop butterfly garden in park area.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

- Result is being shared through staff meetings, conference and seminars.
- 1st paper can be available on Journal of Zoology and Entomology Studies. 2nd paper will be submitted very shortly to one of the journals.
- Vouchers specimen is being displayed in information centre in park.
- Field guidebook on butterflies of RMNP is planned to publish and budget is also already arranged.

7. Timescale: Over what period was The Rufford Foundation grant used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The study period was for 12 months and fund was exclusively used for project accordingly. One year of time period has given us good opportunity to cover all four seasons but still more to explore.

9. Looking ahead, what do you feel are the important next steps?

- Further study and prepare comprehensive checklist of butterfly of southern foothills of Bhutan.
- Index/catalogue all butterflies according to their commonness and rarity and come out with conservation priority. We have some vulnerable species so it should be protected. Second paper has mention about the conservation priority of rare butterflies.
- Educate people on environment and conservation issue.

- Logo was advertised in brochures, awareness banner, meeting and scientific paper (journal).
- I personally have shared information on RSG and two of my friends had received grant and one rejected.
