3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- A. We found the recent occurrence of sloth bears in the study area and mapped bear presence in both protected and unprotected forests of Banaskantha district.
- B. We mapped and evaluated the conflict zones and conflicts respectively in the study area.
- C. We have suggested some conflict mitigation strategies involving local people participation.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

We hired a graduate student as a Research Assistant and two persons as field assistant from the local community. We also involved other local people in the research crew in various activities of the project like, driving a car, preparing food, guiding in the forests, etc. The research assistant has registered herself for her doctoral study and she has continued the research for other districts of North Gujarat region, and she is applying for further funds for completion of her Ph.D.



5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Yes, certainly. As stated earlier, the work will be continued for other two districts of North Gujarat for evaluating bear habitat and conflicts. It is also planned to carry out the research in the region and prepare a bear-human coexistence strategy and recommend foresting authorities for conservation of sloth bear and to revise management plan for the region.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

We are planning to present the results in the forthcoming International conference on bear by International Bear research Association (IBA) on a Global Scale. On a local scale we will publish our results in local journals and magazines published by forest department in local languages so it may reach to the local people.

7. Timescale: Over what period was the RSG used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?
