2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

With this project, we had difficulties regarding the participation of some potential local tour guides. They had a complex schedule regarding their participation in the project. They did not have time to participate in theory sessions, and we had to integrate into their field activities in park forests.

The time conflict between the schedule of local people with the progress of the project occurred, and we were not able to complete the interview session on time. We had to travel to local people's garden to conduct interviews in a large area, resulting in the late of other activities.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

With this project, knowledge and skills of local people were enhanced, maximising the benefits of wildlife conservation programs in Bu Gia Map National Park. Local people are able to lead and conduct ecotourism activities by themselves, and they can generate additional incomes for their families, lessening impacts on the natural forests in Bu Gia Map National Park.



Local people better understand their role in wildlife conservation of Bu Gia Map National Park. More local people are able to participate in wildlife conservation programs by doing different activities that balance the benefits between forest protection and local needs.

The involvement of local people and authorities will create a chance for better conservation activities with account for local needs. We convened a meeting with the participation of local authorities to create a legal channel at the local people. This will ensure the success of both livelihoods for local people and the conservation of wildlife in Bu Gia Map National Park.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

Local people participated in all activities of the project, and they contributed significantly to the success of the project.

With the interview session, local people provided necessary information for us to create a dynamic ecotourism program in Bu Gia Map National Park.

Indigenous people were trained in ecotourism knowledge and skills that are necessary for them for years to come.

Villagers hosted some piloting events in the park and its buffer zones. They received benefits for these activities, and they had chances to boost their strengths and skills for the community-based ecotourism program.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Information, products and reports have been forwarded to park managers, and they committed that they will continue to sharpen indigenous people's skills and knowledge of ecotourism and wildlife conservation.

I will continue to apply for follow up proposal to support for local in developing their private enterprises in ecotourism. I will cooperate with park managers to maximize the benefits for local people by marketing their tradition, handicrafts and customs to make their ecotourism programs more attractive.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

I am writing an article to send to local media about this work. It will help me disseminate information of this work with local people and other stakeholders.

The budgets of The Rufford Foundation grants were alternatively spent with the money funded by park managers. The budgets dovetailed with the proposed length of the project.
