

Project Update: July 2016

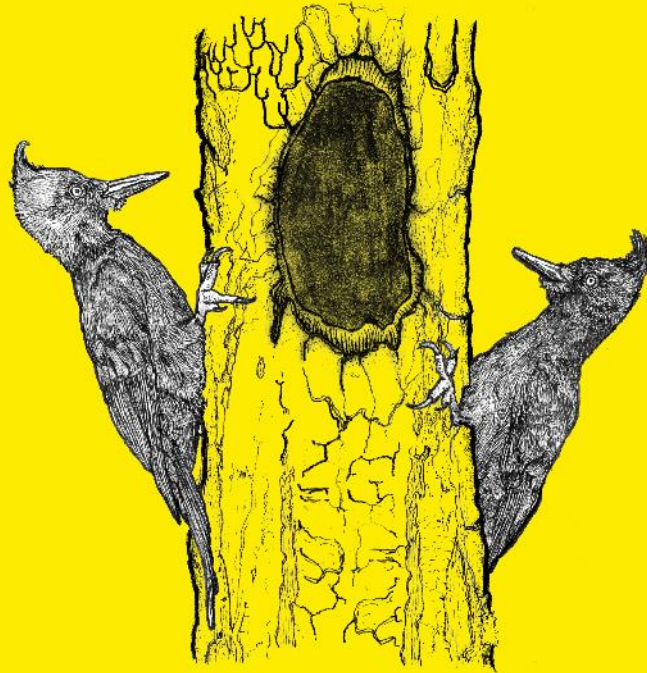
Three posting signs (low resolution) that are currently being prepared to be distributed and installed in private and public forested lands in southern Chile. These signs will be deployed on trees considered biologically-important for cavity nesters, so these trees are directly pointed out as "not allowed to cut or disturb".

We intentionally prepared three type of signs with three "charismatic" and "ecologically-relevant" species. These species include the Magellanic woodpecker, rufous-legged owl (the two species studied in our project #1), and the white-throated tree runner (a species that has been identified as a keystone facilitator because it generates many cavities that are used by many other species for nesting, including mammals and birds).
