The women in Punta Banco became very involved in creating jewelry from beads, seeds, shells, bottle caps and other found objects to sell to tourists. Over the course of a one month period, approximately \$100 was earned toward trash disposal. This project has the potential to be very successful and of great value to the local women as a source of creativity and income. CAP would like to do much more of this type of project in the future.

2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

In the beginning of the project, people were skeptical about the work CAP was doing. They had little or no exposure to art and were somewhat intimidated by the term and by the new presence of the program. However, after CAP resident artists began working with the local school and organizing free, open-to-the-public workshops at the local market, more and more people began participating, sharing their ideas, expressing their gratitude and taking the work to higher levels.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

I believe that the three most important outcomes of the project were 1) a heightened sense of community cohesion, 2) an increased level of concern regarding Punta Banco's environmental state, and 3) the inspirational influence that community art projects had on all participants.

In terms of a heightened sense of community cohesion, the CAP project pulled in members of all different parts of the community. We had a US primatologist working in the region collaborate with CAP artists to present a monkey conservation and puppet making lesson in the local school. Also, members of the nearby Yoga Farm and the PRETOMA turtle nesting volunteers worked in the school and participated in all the workshops offered. Local adults (both men and women) participated in the billboard painting, jewellery making, sewing and organic farm projects.

All the projects had an underlying theme that focused on the environment or caring for the environment and it was beautiful to see such a wide breadth of involvement. People who ordinarily



would not spend time working together suddenly got to know each other as a result of participating in the CAP workshops and events.

Usually it takes years, if not longer, to witness the changes that projects like CAP bring about in local perception and attitudes. However, I had a surprising opportunity to see first-hand some of the fruits of our labour while in Punta Banco. Towards the end of this year's project, one of the local men, Paulo, came up to one of the CAP artists and expressed his gratitude for our commitment to educating and activism around conservation and environmental stewardship. He said that he was so moved by seeing outsiders come into his community and devote their time and energy to these ends that he had begun a monthly committee for beach clean-up. The very next day, he arrived with 4 other men and a tractor pulling a cargo trailer and proceeded to spend 4 hours pulling layers of trash off the beach and loading it in the hot sun. Later that week several members of the community sorted the trash into garbage and recyclable materials and a local resident of Punta Banco donated the funds to have the trash hauled away and disposed of. I cannot put into words how good that made us all feel.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefited from the project (if relevant).

I have already addressed this question in some detail above. But I would like to add a word about the sense of pride and accomplishment that participants feel by finishing an art project and sharing it with the community. Upon completion of the billboards and murals, I heard many community members proudly tell their friends and family what part they drew/wrote/painted. In addition, the students at the Punta Banco School were thrilled to see their art work beautifully displayed for the community to see at the Art & Earth Festival. I feel that the Puppet Theater that the school created and performed for the town during the Festival brought much of our work full circle, as it touched on conservation, sea turtles, poachers, the dangers of trash to wildlife, and our responsibility to care for the planet. People clapped wildly after the performance and the children were puffed up with pride when they took their bow in front of the set. By seeing others place importance on the local environment or natural resources, others began to see these things as assets as well. Especially local businesses that have a tendency to shirk their responsibilities toward maintaining a clean, trash-free community.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

This is my life's work and I plan to continue it for many years as long as I can find the funding or create a source of financial income to allow these projects to be ongoing in multiple communities in Costa Rica.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

I plan to schedule film showings upon completion of the documentary we made this year in addition to traveling art and photography exhibits, publishing a small book on environmental and community art, presenting at the NAEA (National Art Education Association) and promoting this educational outreach model to other conservation organizations.



7. Timescale: Over what period was the RSG used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The RSG was used beginning in March of 2008 and continues to be used as we speak, in October of 2008.

We had to go with digital prints and did not use slides or slide projectors at all. We also had several donations of digital cameras. Also, I was not able to acquire a laptop, as requested.

9. Looking ahead, what do you feel are the important next steps?

I feel that it is crucial that we hire a local artist/activist to offer on-going art workshops and projects throughout the year in Punta Banco. As it stands now, we are able to offer the program for a few months out of the year. I know that by sustaining a presence, CAP is more likely to make an impact on the way people live and perceive of their environment. In addition, I would like to become more involved in the Punta Banco development committee so that the work we do is always tied into the interests and desires of the local residents. I would also like to develop more art projects and skills training for locals to create and market their own artefacts, both as a means for fundraising in order to implement more environmental projects and as a means for making money for their families. I am working on developing a relationship with the Universidad de Costa Rica to create internships or residencies for their environmental education and art students in Punta Banco in the hopes that local youth will build lasting relationships with them. Lastly, I would like to develop a green building (sustainable materials and methods) program in the more distant future, offering workshops to locals and outsiders that highlight smart, long-term, affordable construction for various dwelling spaces that are suitable to very hot, tropical climates.

10. Did you use the RSGF logo in any materials produced in relation to this project? Did the RSGF receive any publicity during the course of your work?

Yes, RSG was publicized during our Earth & Art Festival in August. The RSG logo will be featured on our website, in our documentary and in all other promotional or educational events, such as the planned photo exhibit in San Francisco, California and the documentary inauguration scheduled for early next year.
