This project was solely focussed on awareness and training for the local community. In Annapurna Conservation Area, conservation management committees are major bodies to implement conservation activities and these communities were targeted during implementation of the project. In Chitwan, Buffer Zone Management Committee was targeted. Similarly in Pokhara valley, community forest users were participated in the programme. Additionally, youth club and womens' groups were kept in the loop of program. Overall, local communities were the central thrust of the programme.

The project will be continuing with a research and community mobilisation programme specially focussing "Breeding ecology of migratory birds and conservation of breeding habitat"

The results of work will be shared through scientific journal and presenting papers on conference. Locally, the result was already shared through local media in Pokhara valley. Moreover, electronic copy of this report will be distributed to various organisations working in conservation in Nepal and around the world.
