2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

Permission process for the conduction of research took few more time which made my field visit to the project site a bit later than presumed.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

Status of red panda from three VDCs named Nayakwada, Rokayagaun and Sakala were documented. Community and school based outreach activities were done and three red panda eco clubs were formed in three different school. Six red panda guides were trained and mobilised.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

Local NGOs groups and local youths, who are involved in conservation of red panda habitat, have very limited knowledge on conservation. Through this project capacity building trainings were conducted to encourage the local youth and members of NGOs and to take interest in red panda based ecotourism as a source of livelihood. Local peoples could bring about collective action for the conservation of this species only when they get to know the ecological importance of red panda. Hence locals were mobilised with research team for the exploration of its habitat and abundance and were paid. Three different eco clubs under school management for the collective action for the conservation of red panda and other wildlife were institutionalised which is another benefit of this project for the local



communities. One of the local field facilitator named" Bhim Bahadur Singh of Jiri, Nayawada was interested to deliver speech on red panda after outreach activity in local language which helps them understand about red panda in their own language.

Likewise, we promote use of local vegetables, food items and local market for buying necessary items. Use of local items helps them earn some money. Field assistant were paid as per proposed rate based on their performance. These project expenditures in their local communities were illustrated as an income for them due to presence of red panda in their forests.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Yes, there are few plans to continue this work. Yes I have planned to conduct "Pathshala Habre" which could serve as open school to know about red panda habitat for students in red panda habitat. Similarly, anti-poaching student rally in the project site's settlement would be of great importance to conserve red panda in the project site.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

The results of my work has been shared to local stakeholders through local media like local FM, local newspaper and through national daily newspaper to those who are not well familiar with scientific journal. I have planned to get this research



published in scientific journal. Results of work will be reported to concerned government authority as well.

7. Timescale: Over what period was The Rufford Foundation grant used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The Rufford Foundation grant has been used within the time frame. Almost 95% was used within project field duration and rest was used during data entry, interpretation and report preparation time. Project budget was used within 8 months of the project.
