2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

We did not face any serious difficulties during the programme. Despite our experience with the Albanian road conditions in the previous researches we have had in the country, we were not able to travel between sites of interest as fast as we

had planned before. Mainly crossing the mountain areas was more complicated than we had expected. In May 2016, the huge amount of rain caused unpleasant moments for the bird bander teams. Nevertheless. We managed to replace the time we were not able to work by being all the time out in the field and working in bad weather conditions too.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

a) We were able to visit, collect very valuable information and prepare habitat maps (see Annex 1) about the seven largest reedbeds of Albania, so far not fully explored and often neglected despite being sites of very important conservation concern. Their importance on bird migration and their conservation status has been evaluated together with factors threatening such highly important bird habitats.

- We have also discovered the Black-marsh of Roskovec, such an important reedbed without any kind of protection status and we will propose its utmost protection to the relevant Albanian authorities on nature protection and protected areas.

b) We have cooperated very closely with the Albanian Ornithological Society (AOS) in creating and further strengthening bird banding capacities in the country. We could manage to work out a really good partnership with the Albanian Ornithological Society (AOS). We raised up their awareness on the importance of the bird banding as the method of bird monitoring. During the fieldwork we were able to teach them about the basics of bird ringing and bird identification in hand.

Furthermore, AOS arranged a 45 minutes TV report about our common work and goals, which has broadcasted in a local TV channel and reached a lot of people.

c) Our autumn bird band camp was really successful. We captured and marked an extraordinary number of 850 moustached warblers. We recaptured 14 moustached warblers which had been marked before within the Carpathian Basin, proving the importance of the Albanian reedbeds in the view of bird migration. The feedbacks of different kinds of social media shows that the Albanian university students and other youngsters who visited our camp are deeply impressed about the research we are doing.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

Both during the Spring reedbed research and the Autumn bird ringing camp we were working together with our colleagues from AOS, and we managed to organise field presentations about the survey and the bird banding to more than 60 local youngsters.



5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Certainly our association is looking forward to continue with the program. We already have some plans for the future, such as:

- To organise a 2-week bird ringing camp in the spring season in Rushkull Reserve, because we do not have any data's about the importance of this habitat for the spring migration of the moustached warbler.
- In May 2017, in cooperation with AOS we would like to organise a photo exhibition in Tirana, about our common project and the results of work.
- In May 2017, we will have a presentation in Tirana about the research and the achievements of our project under the title of Migration of the Moustached Warbler along the Mediterranean Shore.
- We would like to start the more detailed research of the important reedbeds of Albania, with the aim of giving suggestions about the management of the habitats.
- Next year we would like to invite our Albanian colleagues to our bird bander camp in Hungary again.
- Providing AOS with the relevant logistic (mist nets, pliers etc.) in order to develop a self-sustained bird banding scheme in Albania and further strengthening the capacities of our local partner in bird conservation.
- Finally, we would like to keep working with the autumn bird banding in the Rushkull Reserve next year too.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

We are planning to present the results of the research with professional publications and with informative presentations and articles.

7. Timescale: Over what period was The Rufford Foundation grant used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

We started the spring reedbed research a few days earlier (end of April 2016) than we planned. The reason of this decision is that besides the breeding bird populations of the reedbeds we could take a look on the late spring migration too. This change did not modified the amount of the fieldwork days. The autumn bird banding camp was supposed to last 5 weeks, but because of the pouring rain of the last week we decided to finish 1 week earlier. The camp became almost inaccessible, the water level of the marsh increased highly so the work with the mist nets in the reed turned to be really difficult as well.
