
Project Update: June 2016

- 1. In April 2016 our project:
- Provide a workshop regarding the biology and ecology of the jaguars to the local guides of Tortuguero National Park, Costa Rica.
- Produced a poster for educational activities regarding our main findings in Barra del Colorado Wildlife Refuge, Costa Rica.
- Carry out dissemination activities with educational institutions and local community organizations in Barra del Colorado Wildlife Refuge to present the main findings of our survey carry out in the area.
- 2. In May our project finalised and published protocols regarding how to behave during a jaguar encounter. These protocols have been adopted by local research organisations working in the area of Tortuguero National Park. Further to this the project has produced and disseminated educational posters regarding this topic.
- 3. In June the project was asked by the administration of the park to participate in a weeklong refreshment seminar for the guides of Tortuguero National Park. During this seminar we presented the main finding for the previous year, and provided training and resources based on our protocols for jaguar encounters.
