- (1) I used five-capital theory to explain clearly how local peoples' livelihoods affected by protected area.
- (2) Based on sustainable livelihoods framework, I analysed how local people's livelihoods changes and how they adapt to it.
- (3) By using multiple case study method, I compared why one place local people get more benefits than the other place.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

In two places, totally 100 households participated in my interview. Although they didn't directly get benefit from my study, but as my study is based on local people's perspective, it may contribute to future policy making.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Yes. During my study period, China started her first batch of national parks programme, one of my study area—Shennongjia, was selected as one of the first national park. As a national park, related regulations and laws changed. Next step, I want to explore how these new regulations affects local people.



6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

The results of this study is part of my PhD thesis. And I plan to publish three papers from it. Now, I have finished one paper, and now it is under revision by my supervisor. I am writing the other two.

Most of grant was used for my fieldwork. I did my fieldwork from July 2016 to November 2016.
