This training provided leadership skills and created the space for women to discuss how their participation can be increased in the management of natural resource in their counties.

The purpose of the meetings was to help the groups evaluate their activities after the training and design plan for the future. The meetings were also used to facilitate the process of election of officials for the Women Conservation Groups and develop byelaws and constitutions for their smooth operation and to develop action plans.

2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

During the rainy season in 2010 many of the roads that were generally accessible during the dry season got damaged because of the heavy downpour of rain. This created problems in gathering women in a specific location for training and meetings. As these roads could not be used by vehicles, women and FCI staff had to use motorcycles which increased the cost of transportation. This, also coupled with the fluctuation of the exchange rate reduced the USD in which project funds were expended.



3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

The three most important outcomes are:

- > Seventy-five women from three districts in Grand Bassa and River Cess counties were trained in leadership, mobilizing and participatory skills.
- > Three Women Conservation Groups were organised by clustering the trained women.
- ➤ The Women Conservation Groups have been trained to develop action plan and have developed a 3-month action plan from January to March and will develop subsequent plans at the end of every 3 months.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

Local people, especially the leaders, have shown great deal of commitments in support of FCI's work in Grand Bassa and Rivercess counties during the two projects supported by RSG in the counties. During workshops and training, high ranking local leaders were invited to make opening speeches which they honoured. They have during these events encouraged their people, especially women, to seize the opportunity provided by FCI in the county to contribute to the development of their counties. Women from the communities were the ones involved in all of the project activities and benefited from training. Knowledge gained from the training and action plans is now being used to develop local communities and their involvement in the decision-making processes about natural resources in the various communities. Twenty of the direct beneficiaries from the training and women Conservation Groups participated in the regional women conference of 35 women under the theme "Women Involvement in Forest Governance" in Grand Bassa County hosted by FCI.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Increasing women's participation in decision making about natural resources and development is still a new issue in Liberia that needs to be sustained with constant follow up on women who are trained and training additional women to increasing the number of women participants in development activities. This is essential for the purpose of sustainability of the activities while FCI gradually phase out of the communities.



6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

After the submission of this generic report, FCI plans to develop a comprehensive narrative and financial report that represent activities carried out in the two counties with support from RSG over the past 2 years. This report will be hosted on FCI and RSG website for easy access to stakeholders who intend to work in these counties on similar issues. The report will also be shared with organisations focusing on women development in Liberia for the purpose of sharing information and networking.

- 1. Hold more follow up meetings with these trained women and groups.
- 2. Provide initial logistical support to the Women Conservation Groups (WCGs) until their activities are sustainable
- 3. Hold additional training in other relevant areas to enhance their capacity.
- 4. Increase the scope of the project by reaching out in additional counties targeting existing women groups.
- 5. Hold a national Forum for rural women to share the participation and leadership skills with other women groups from other parts of country.
