Project Update: February 2018

We have been visiting Calilegua National Park for the past 6 months, three nights per campaign. In each visit, we have registered frog and toad activities (reproductive behaviour). Likewise, we have been downloading data from our autonomous recorders, and data loggers (temperature and relative humidity). No sightings of the missing frog (*Gastrotheca chrisiatni*) yet. Fortunately, we made records of *Rhinella rumbolli*, a threatened and endemic Yungas toad!

My team and I carried out two workshops for educative purposes in San Salvador de Jujuy for high school students. Also, in "El Rey" National Park we talked to graduate students and national park rangers.

We made contact with The Lost Species organisation to spread out the word about the missing marsupial frog and our efforts to find them.

Data from our recorders are being analysed and hopefully, in the next months we will be able to edit the first audio-visual field guide for anuran species of Calilegua National Park.
