Estimation of the current abundance of the Four Horned Antelope in Gir Protected Area				The abundance estimation of the focal species could be achieved through distance sampling on vehicle transects traversing across the study area, and subsequent analysis of the collected data using Distance software.
Understanding the factors that govern distribution and occupancy of the species				This objective could be achieved in the current scenario, further surveys would help in enhancing our knowledge on the distribution of the species in and around the study area
Identification of the threats for conservation of the species				Continued surveys will help in understanding the conservation threats to the species.
Generation of awareness among different stakeholders				Throughout the course of the project, several interactions with the forest staff and locals have helped in generating awareness about the species.

2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

There was a delay in obtaining the permission from the competent authority to conduct the project work at the field site. The commencement of the project work was therefore delayed.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- The project helped in understanding the population status of the four horned antelope in the Gir protected area.
- Factors governing the distribution of the species in the study area could be understood.
- Awareness on the conservation significance of the species was created among different stakeholders in the study area.



4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

During the interactions with locals during the project, it was realized that there was a lot of ambiguity among them in identifying the four horned antelope. Most people confused them with the chinkara. Many locals were unsure of their existence in Gir. Throughout the course of the project, conservation awareness was generated among them through photographs, resource materials developed as a part of the project, presentations, etc. Locals with a good understanding of wildlife were trained in field data collection and hired as field assistants for the project work.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Continued field effort will enhance our understanding of the ecology of the four horned antelope in the study area. More awareness needs to be generated among public in other adjoining areas where the species exists.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

The results of the work will be shared with the Forest Department to aid conservation and management. Resource material developed as a part of the project will be circulated among different stakeholders and interactions with locals will continue.

7. Timescale: Over what period was The Rufford Foundation grant used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The grant was awarded in June 2017. The project period was stipulated to be one year. The permission from the competent authority to conduct work in the Gir Protected Area was obtained in late November 2017. The project work was carried out from December 2017 to November 2018.
