Project Update: June 2018

During the first quarter of the project we organised our first project planning meeting with all team members. This meeting was instrumental in the scheduling of the activities for the first two quarters of the project. We also ran five training sessions, one in Hurghada, one in Quseir and three in the Marsa Alam area. In total 12 dive centres participated and more than 130 dive masters, dive instructors and snorkeling guides were trained.

We also developed training and promotional material that has been distributed to the dive centre managers and all participants to the workshops. We also have started the regular monitoring of five turtle feeding grounds, and during the first quarter of the project we conducted 97 surveys and recorded 187 turtles. 500 more turtles were reported by over 50 citizen scientists in only 3 months, thanks mainly to the training events and the advertising of the project. In such a short time, we were able to add 130 new turtles to our catalogue.

Finally, divers reported an injured turtle in one of our monitoring areas. The injury seemed to be caused by a speedboat or a propeller. Since the accident, we have been collecting pictures of the turtle regularly and we are currently monitoring the situation with the help of a turtle veterinary. "Altea", the injured turtle, seems to be recovering fast. This is the first example of marine turtle recovery monitoring in the wild carried out by citizen scientists and has attracted a lot of interest.

For the next quarter, we will be continuing with our regular surveys and compiling data received by citizen scientists. We will also be organising a few events with local schools during the summer break.
