2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled.

The submission of final report was delayed due to delay of the field work by Covid 19 restrictions. So, we requested RSG to extend the date to complete the field work and submit the final report.



3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- Dugong Watch WhatsApp group It helps to exchange the local news about turtles, dugongs, winds and fishery, which will be very helpful during the stranding of dugongs. This group was helpful in Covid 19 lock down - relief work in fishing villages.
- Dugong awareness events were organised for 1540 students in 25 schools in October 2019, November 2019, December 2019 and January 2020 in Thanjavur, Pudukkottai and Ramnad District coastal village schools.
- Dugong awareness booklets were distributed to all the school students but we still need to distribute to more fishing villages through our awareness events.
 These booklets are the important tool during our school and village level awareness events.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project.

The proposed project is created awareness about dugongs directly among fishers and their children in schools. It also helps to identify the beneficiaries of our other livelihood-based conservation projects for mangrove plantation, squid breeding and mud crab conservation.

- a) Donation of female, pregnant, goats to fisher women the first goat kid will be returned back to OMCAR to donate to other families. Similarly, organic vegetable gardens have been established in fisher households by OMCAR for free of cost. Both goats and vegetable garden are based on the written agreement between each fisher women and OMCAR that they will be participating in our mangrove plantation in estuaries, palm tree plantation on beach and avenue tree plantation/maintenance in their village streets.
- b) The dugong watch network (WhatsApp group) helped to identify and distribute the Covid 19 lock down relief materials to large number of people.
- c) We hope the same network will respond quickly in case of dugong rescue and release needed anytime in Palk Bay.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

In 2022, we still continue school level awareness events are going on well; at the same time we closely work with Government for the establishment of Dugong Conservation Reserve in Palk Bay (India's first dugong conservation reserve).

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

Our work has been widely shared through our website, WhatsApp and Facebook regularly. I will be sharing our work to international participants as presentations, direct discussion or as posters. Our work got published in 2021.



7. Timescale: Over what period was the grant used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The project grants were used as per the proposed year, except 4600 GBP, which was later used in 2021 to complete the project activities.

9. Looking ahead, what do you feel are the important next steps?

In 2022, Government has initiated Government Order for Dugong Conservation Reserve in Palk Bay, which will be India's first of its kind. OMCAR continuously worked with Forest Department to develop the concept, GIS and planning the reserve until today.

- Establishment of government-run dugong conservation education with the support of OMCAR.
- Establishment of low cost, eco-friendly restoration techniques for seagrass, mangroves and coral reefs through experiment and peer review publications.
- Last but not least, successful rescue and release of dugongs will be expanded with more stakeholders. Defined Protocols as published. And our last 10 years of marine mammal stranding will be published in 2021; this baseline information is being helpful in dugong conservation reserve planning.
- Such huge projects (according to point a, b and c) within government have been evolving through my years of non-profit technical support in proposal writing, GIS and experience that I have been built in the last 8 years through Rufford Grants and other funding partners.

10. Did you use The Rufford Foundation logo in any materials produced in relation to this project? Did the Foundation receive any publicity during the course of your work?

Yes, the Rufford logo has been used in every booklet we printed. It has been used in our banners displayed in school and village meetings. I have been mentioning about Rufford contribution every talk, speeches.

11. Please provide a full list of all the members of your team and briefly what was their role in the project.

- **Dr. V. Balaji** Director. My role is to explain the team about this project and give them time schedule to complete their weekly tasks. I am also responsible for staff selection, content making and printing of booklet, save dugong app introduction to my team, motivating staffs and volunteers. Printing banners. Leading fisher meetings & official permissions from inline departments for awareness events in schools and villages.
- **Mr. G. Murugesan.** His role was the coordination of field staffs according to the schedule and reporting to me. He makes phone calls to organize schools. He visits village leaders to organize field meetings with fishers. He split the work within the staff team and monitor them.
- **Mr. Thayumanavan.** He was responsible for organizing awareness events for school events and mangrove nursery.



Ms. Lakshmi. She was responsible for village awareness events and catering arrangements for school students during marine conservation education at our centre.

Ms. Panchavarnam. She was/has been responsible for daily management of office.

Mr. Marimuthu. He is the driver for our boat and a traditional fisherman who has four decades of experience in local sea conditions. He helped to fix meeting venue, time with fishers.

Mr. Dass. He is responsible for assisting Thaymanavan for school awareness events. Distribution of booklet. Photographic documentation. Pre-meeting arrangements with Marimuthu.
