## Project Update: April 2021

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, we had to delay the start of our project activities until February 2021. Our project activities commenced with the celebration of World Pangolin Day (20th February 2021). On the day, the project team was hosted at the studios of Greena FM (95.9 MHz) and two community information centers where we interacted and enlightened listeners on the current global threats and need to save the remaining populations of pangolins in Ghana.

So far, the team has also deployed 15 camera traps across three different locations (forest blocks) in the Asukese Forest Reserve. The team is led by the Principal Researcher (Agro Prince Pascal), includes one Field Assistant, and one student (as part of our capacity-building initiative), a driver, and four local community members providing labour support. We have revisited previous locations to monitor non or reduced hunting compliance following the first RSG project in the area. Additionally, Wildlife Conservation Clubs have been formed in four schools with a total of 88 members including 80 school kids and eight teachers as club patrons. The inauguration will be done when schools reopen later this month.
