Effective management of occupants in AP Corridor Forestier bongolava				We have identified 685 occupants, who were the subject of the specifications signed between FBM team and each interested party. But there are still unidentified occupants in the southern part of AP (district Mampikony).
Contribution to sustainable wood supply				About 9003 seedlings have been produced of which 6873 are planted.

2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled.

We have a problem with the water supply when producing seedlings. We had to install a well with the establishment of the nursery.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

From this project, here are the three most important results:

- The occupants in northern part of the AP Corridor Forestier Bongolava are identified and have signed a specification.
- A nursery centre meeting the needs of the FBM team is installed.
- 6873 seedlings are planted.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project.

During this project, the involvement of local communities was made at all levels ranging from indigenous authorities and villagers. The authorities were fully engaged during organisational meetings on the identification and census of occupants inside the protected area of Corridor Forestier Bongolava.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

The protected area of the Corridor Forestier Bongolava is made up of two districts: Mampikony et Port-Bergé. From this project, we were able to identify the occupants in these two districts. But only the information on the land of the occupants in the district of Port-Bergé is known. In the future, we deem it necessary to continue this



project by collecting information on the land of the occupants in the district of Mampikony and hire these occupants as planned by signing a specification. Also, with the growing demand in relation to the energy needs of the local population, we plan to initiate the charcoal sector at the level of a few potential municipalities.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

We plan to publish our work through the journal Conservation Evidence but this is in progress.

7. Timescale: Over what period was the grant used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The project started in July 2020. Compared to the planned duration (1 year), there is no significant delay.
