Introduction of dogs in livestock flocks			Fully achieved	Eight dogs are donated to seven different shepherds and are successfully introduced in livestock flocks. Exception is only one case that the dog died of a scorpion bite.

Training with shepherds			Fully achieved	Training / meetings are developed and are still going on whenever there is a need. The veterinary personnel and the local coordinator that covers the project area are still supporting shepherds in some cases.

The difficulties encountered in gathering all people involved due to their obligations changed the project objective in creating separate coordination and monitoring meetings.

2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

A few unforeseen difficulties occurred during the project implementation but were successfully resolved. The first problem encountered was the death of one six-month old dog. We had to replace it with another one. The second problem was to organize the dog's competition, because of lack in infrastructure in the selected area we had to postpone the competition till spring 2009. On 2nd May 2009 the biggest dog competition in ethnic Albania had happened. More than 200 dogs participated and almost 3000 visitors from all Balkans, Hungary and Germany were present.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

We realized to introduce successfully seven dogs in different sheep flocks in the project area and to create the nucleus of this dog race. The most important outcome is the feedback from the farmers, they are continuingly asking for more dogs and information how to get them. There is also an initiative from one farmer in Stebleva village to buy dogs himself. We are still expecting results from the crossbreeding scheme that will start after 5 months and the good feedback received from the



shepherds is an encouraging result because of the livestock protecting with autochthon race of dogs is functioning.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

Seven shepherds have received livestock guarding dogs for their flock's protection from large carnivores. A local coordinator, the veterinary unit and other farmers that have not received yet any dog are consulted and involved in the scheme of dog supplying.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

The work done so far will continue in the next years there is a detailed strategy how to introduce more LGD (livestock guarding dogs) not only in the national park Jabllanica – Shebenik but also in other parks. A Balkan network of dog breeders, farmers, shepherds, hunters and people interested in cynology is created in order to support every activity in this frame. However, the scheme of dog's reproduction in the project selected area will continue till the end of this year and we are expecting 15 more puppies to distribute within this year. Albanian Cynological Association in cooperation with Cynological Federation in Kosovo and specialized dog breeding farms in Macedonia is planning to promote furthermore the values of traditional livestock guarding attitudes with autochthon dog breeds.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

Different articles are written about the project purposes in several magazines, information materials are distributed with other interested groups, fundraising processes on maintaining a website are ongoing, and a book is planned to be published within this year.

7. Timescale: Over what period was the RSG used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The RSG was used from September 2007 till May 2009. There is only one postponed activity (the dogs' competition); however, we are expecting result till the end of this year to complete the full scheme of dog's reproduction and distribution (first session).
