2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

A group of 5 young well educated men who have opposed the project for the last five years (out of jealousy) continued campaigning against the project among the local communities and local politicians. With RSG funds we were able to neutralise their campaign in the following five ways:

- community meetings;
- radio programmes;
- participation in public celebrations such as World Environment Day and World Food Day where by our message reached a wider public including politicians;
- talking to individual politicians and opinion leaders;
- talking to each of the detractors individually using people outside the project.

Also fuel prices rose by about 40% before the project started and the trend has continued.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- Greater awareness within the district leadership and the local communities about the global status and potential benefits of chimpanzee conservation.
- Establishment of Kayirabwa Community Chimpanzee Sanctuary. Over 100 households with about 400 ha of forest on their land have formed an association to conserve the chimpanzees in it and develop ecotourism in the area. The association was launched on 4th December 2008 during the World Food Day celebrations for the district held in the area (see attached photos).
- Generation of interest among other stakeholders including international conservation agencies such as WWF.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefited from the project (if relevant).

One community has formed a community-based organisation (the Kayirabwa Community Chimpanzee Sanctuary Association) as the first step to conserve chimpanzees on their land. The greatest benefit has been the acquisition of knowledge about conservation and potential benefit such as development of ecotourism.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

As we have been doing we shall continue to share reports with stakeholders such as WWF, Chimpanzee Sanctuary & Wildlife Conservation Trust and Uganda Wildlife Authority (UWA).

7. Timescale: Over what period was the RSG used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

Six months (May - November 2008). The planned four months were a bit unrealistic as I had to attend a write shop and the Africa Carbon Forum in South Africa and Senegal in June and September respectively.

9. Looking ahead, what do you feel are the important next steps?

We intend to submit a new proposal for the Second RSG on the development of ecotourism and related activities focusing on one site - Kayirabwa Community Chimpanzee Sanctuary.

As the pioneer chimpanzee conservation project in the district, it has provided the basic information on which other projects can spring from throughout the district. Nevertheless, more still needs to be done using a multi-stakeholder approach.
