1. Please indicate the level of achievement of the project's original objectives and include any relevant comments on factors affecting this.

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2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

- 1. All members are not equally innovative; activities are not done by all members.
- 2. Low growth rate of the planted materials. This reduces the number products in the market and the fashioning is almost the same???
- 3. Some times members can use the three stone hearths when it is cold hence consuming too much fuel wood.
- 4. Seasonal/ climate changes which affect the planted materials leading to low yields of materials and reduce the number of products per output.



3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- 1. New types and designs of craft products. Increasing the craft varieties in the shop. Most of the members can have at least five different types of crafts in the shop per month.
- 2. The savings of each member have increased because members are saving more from the increased crafts sales. This has boosted the disposable income in the homes of members.
- 3. Increase in trees planted per household. These trees will be used by the homes in future. This is like an investment that will keep growing. This has all resulted into increased community awareness on tree planting and natural resources sustainable use on the household level.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

The local communities (members and non-members) are involved in the weaving activities after learning from the members. We allow these community members to sell their crafts in our crafts shop and the income goes directly to them. Besides the income:

- 1. They have gained increased skills of saving some of their income. Some groups outside our group were trained in saving and now have saving schemes.
- 2. They have benefited from training in using medicinal plants and natural dyes for craft materials. When they:
 - a. Get better markets for the crafts using natural dyes.
 - b. Use organic medicine that is healthier as well as enabling them to save money they would use to go to the hospital.
- 3. They have saved more time and energy when they use less firewood. The time originally used to collect firewood has been used to do other activities that increase the family's welfare and economic status. Also, the improved fuel efficient stoves don't emit smoke. For this reason, they have less risk of causing respiratory and eye diseases to the people using them compared to the people using the three stone hearths.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Continuation of the work of the project is both obvious and necessary for the group and the community since the activities supported by the project concern the daily life of the woman in this community. In the group, we have a plan of continuing with the work in the following steps.

- 1. Continue with tree planting, both planting more seedlings and maintaining the already planted trees during this project.
- 2. Putting to use the already planted craft materials and exploring more markets for the produce.
- 3. Passing on the acquired skills of crafts weaving, tree planting and other business skills.

The group will partner with the Rwenzori community development centre (RCDC) to undertake weekly training to enable the project to pass on the skills to the rest of the community. RCDC is already offering skills training in tourism, environment conservation, and sustainable agriculture and offering a venue to other community development groups of indigenous people to implement other community development projects.

In a new document that is being developed to build the capacity of the centre, our group will partner with RCDC to implement the next project. The project will aim at facilitating the continuation and replication of the achievements of this last project.



6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

Rwenzori community development centre as an indigenous community based organisation, will work to facilitate the study of the achievement of this project and help to develop the proper replication system. The replication will be through:

- 1. Organised weekly training.
- 2. Field study tours between members.
- 3. Development of the demonstration sites at the centre.

The work of the centre is not only focused on the achievements of the project but also meeting the goals of the centre aiming and development through exchange of skills.

7. Timescale: Over what period was the RSG used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The project has been implemented in 15 .5 months. The actual length of the project was 15 months. The delay of 0.5 a month was due to unavoidable circumstances such as timing of the activities, and other commitments by the implementers.
