2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

Persistent war between the Congolese Army and the Rwandese Armed Groups known as Interahamwe-FDLR was a serious handicap to the project development and a danger to workers. One of our educators (Mr Asukulu M'mema) was killed in August 2009 just at the end of the project. This worse situation was cause of delay of our activities. We tried to work when there was not fighting.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- Women from Mboko village have acquired knowledge and skills through training and talks good practices of mushroom collecting, processing and conservation.
- Community representatives accepted to participate in discussion forums at Irangi, Mwenga and Miki. This is an evidence of their interest in the Itombwe forest conservation initiative.
- Local people have accepted the creation of the Itombwe Natural Reserve (INR) and presently a map for delineating the area is under production by WWF.



4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

Local education group committees were created and are led by community representatives. Women from Mboko benefited from training in mushroom collecting and sustainable natural resource use.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

There is a follow-up action plan. We need continue conservation education campaigns until the IRN is managed and local communities are involved. The Congolese Government has designated a Warden who is based at Mwenga and local young people were recruited in order bring people to support the conservation actions. Accordingly, we intend enhance in the future, the cooperation with local communities by implementing some integrated conservation and development projects including small scale livestock breeding, tree planting and sustainable mushroom harvesting.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

We intend to organize a workshop with stakeholders at Mwenga the Headquarters of the INR under the auspices of the Congolese Wildlife Authority (Institut Congolais pour la Conservation de la Nature, ICCN).

News from the field will be published in the local Magazine called Kivu Safari (DR Congo) and the CLP News Letters (UK).

Report will be sent to the Congolese Wildlife Authority called ICCN in Kinshasa and to other partners.

7. Timescale: Over what period was the RSG used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

Previous timescale (9 months): April-December 2008. But the fact that we have received the funds in August 2008, the timescale was modified. Moreover, due to the war in Eastern DR Congo, we really started the project activities from January 2009 and finished in September 2009.
