2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

As they never have any experiences teaching marine environmental education as a part of any subjects they taught, they do not have confidence to deliver in their classroom. We have discussed and how this programme can be linked to any subjects and how teachers can use teaching methods that makes children can receive the lesson easily.

Time schedule were a little bit behind because they have school break more than we expected. For example, year 1 to year 5 will have a break during year 6 final exams. We anticipated by replace it to another day.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

1. Children more interested to learn more about their marine environment.
2. Children more understanding about some issues related to the sea such as destructive fishing methods (bomb), cutting the mangrove trees and rubbish and take some positive action such as establish club.
3. Schools are keen to continue the programme.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

Parents allow their children to be a part of this programme since some parents are not because they want their children to help them in the house, looking after their cattle or garden. This shows that the parents understanding that this is valuable experiences for their children.

Local fishermen help us in providing boats to take children to visit mangrove forests and other villagers provide some mangrove seeds for kids to be planted in plot area.

Local marine conservation board provide a place for us to organise kid's conference and give children a plot of land to be planted with mangrove and let children to look after the trees.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

This pilot project has made good outcomes to schools and community. There are some neighbour schools are interesting to introduce the similar programme to their schools. This is a good opportunity to expand the programme and initiate this programme link into local curriculum.

We will sell some merchandise to raise some money so we can keep this programme running. We will organise origami sea animals demo and introduce the programme during the promotion event.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

We have printed booklet and prepare a presentation that we can use to introduce this programme to other schools. Some teacher working group are invited us to come and do presentation. And we will visit local education office in the near future.

This programme period for one year school programme and effectively run for 9 months excluded school breaks.
