## Project Update: October 2018

The live traps and camera traps were installed at previous locations (first phase) for small mammals survey. Unlike the first phase, we were successful in recording red giant flying squirrel twice through roost survey. 400 households, affiliated with different community forests and forest user groups were surveyed (using semi structured questionnaire).

Amongst 10 citizen scientists who participated in the training on small mammal survey and monitoring techniques, three were recruited for regular field survey as they seemed highly interested and committed towards conservation.

1000 copies of posters and 500 stickers including information about need of small mammal conservation and current threats to them were printed for awareness programme. Posters and stickers were distributed to district forest office, sector office, llaka forest office, Ghodaghodi Area Conservation and Public Awareness Forum (the local NGO), schools and local tea shops where number of people gather for discussions. Information about importance of wetlands, status of small mammal status in Ghodaghodi Lake Complex (GLC) and need of conservation was disseminated through PowerPoint presentation to different schools and communities of Ghodaghodi municipality.
