2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

Time to finish the project was not sufficient even after an extension and prolonged drought has been a challenge particularly for rehabilitation activities such as planting grasses.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

(i) The project was well received by the local communities and majority of the stakeholders and we unravel ecotourism as a livelihood alternative in the area.

(ii) Educators were well equipped theoretically and practically and we are confident that they will spear conservation endeavours around the Lake Natron.

(iii) School environmental education programmes were established strengthened and is continuing and all the 3 outcomes leads to improved livelihoods and status of the Lake Natron ecosystem.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

Local communities were fully involved from the beginning to the end of the project. They were involved directly through active attending meetings and asking and answering questions. They also got involved indirectly through various representatives, government officials and community leaders.



5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Yes, we are working with the district authority to further this project especially continue with the rehabilitation activities and see possibility of establishing ranches. We have also agreed with the educators to continue with education programmes at schools and encourage ecotourism.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

The knowledge and skills developed could be used in other places where there are similar challenges to conservation of wetlands. We are going to share our gained experience with other local communities, learning institutions and conservation agencies in Tanzania. This will be achieved through poster development and distribution, seminars and workshops. Some of our project members are teaching and we will impart that knowledge to our students.

7. Timescale: Over what period was the RSG used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The RSG was used during the period of the project. However, we have exceeded the original thought duration by 3 months.

We are keen to see that the livelihoods of Maasai communities and the entire Lake Natron ecosystem improved. We shall continue working with the districts authorities, schools and local communities. We are negotiating with the districts to start putting aside funds specifically for restoration and management of the Lake Natron cross boundary ecosystem while ensure livelihoods of the surrounding communities is improved. We plan also to apply for the booster fund to facilitate preparation of local communities taking overall responsibility in the conservation.
