Discovered a second population of iguanas on smaller cay, removed 80% of large pine trees on island. We were able to burn a large amount of brush that was left when trees were cut by someone else several years ago.

The local community would like us to give outreach programmes on the main island. This species (Sandy cay iguana) is only found on this island and they were not aware of this. They are proud that we want to protect this very important species of the Bahamas and be more involve in the process.

Yes the goal is to remove all Australian pine from Sandy cay. We are very close to this goal, one more trip and we should be done.
