Keep bird monitoring in selected sites and continue to searching threatened endangered species like silvery pigeon. Small Island in the southern part of Bangka Island is very potential area for remaining population of silvery pigeon. Conducting a wide biodiversity survey is needed to the island, because although second largest island in Sumatra, but biodiversity exploration in the island still lacking.
