Project Update: October 2010

The main activity was a field tour of Wambabya wetland. The aim was to assess its current status, the activities within the catchment area and compliance with the Uganda wetland management policies. The tour was conducted in the upper and middle segments of Wambabya. Pre-planning meetings were organised to select members to participate and other modalities during the tour. Twenty people living close to the wetlands participated. A walk around with selected members was undertaken, trekking through the hilly, valley forested area of the wetland.

It was observed that close to 50% of 30 m buffer zone was being encroached on. The main activities practised within the area included crop farming.

The main challenge remains the demand for incentives and compensation for people to get away from the buffer zone. The tour showed to the farmers that a lot remains to be done if compliance was to be achieved.
