Vulture numbers, rate of nesting success rise

130 Vultures Spotted Between Viramgam, Surendranagar

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Ahmedabad: Vulture conser-vationists were pleased to spot some 45-50 nests of 130 white rumped vultures between Vi-ramgam in Ahmedabad dis-trict and Surendranagar after some five years. What is fue-ling their excitement is that the nesting success rate was greater than 50% this season.

Sources in the forest de-partment said these numbers were last seen in 2009 in the area. In the recent past there were some nesting sites but not as many as these. The 2010 and 2012 vulture census by forest department had shown no traces of vultures in the area.

Officials said the return of vultures began in 2013, but this year the number of nests is 45-50 and with a high suc-cess rate of 50%.

According to Aditya Roy, who is working in the area and is doing his doctorate thesis: 'Status and Conservation of Gyps vultures in Provisional



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Vulture Safe Zone Central Gu-jarat, Ahmedabad,' in association with the Salim Ali Centre for Ornithology and Natural History, Coimbatore, said: "The results are very encoura-ging as in the recent past one couldn't find vultures here."

"The return of the vulture indicates that use of diclofe-nac in treatment for cattle is under control and as a result the scavenging birds are ma-king a comeback. The overall outcome of the project will be the creation of a diclofenac-free vulture safe zone of app-rox. 30,000 sq.km surrounding Ahmedabad," said Roy.

He further said Gujarat has started witnessing sigh-tings of Himalayan griffons, Eurasian griffons and cinere-ous vultures between Decem-ber and March and Egyptian

vultures round the year in and around Little Rann of Kutch. These scavengers mainly come to roost in the Little Rann and then feed on carcasses in nearby areas.

vulture The population of the Charotar region of Cen-tral Gujarat is also steadily in-creasing. From some 35-40 vultures and seven nests counted in the twin districts of Anand and Kheda in 2013, the popula-tion has increased to around 75 birds with some 15 nests in the Charotar belt.
